MHCO continued to manage and adjust to the Covid – 19 pandemic through 2021. The adjustments were a challenge for the children and their families, staff, and friends of MHCO as interaction continued to be limited. In spite of the challenges the children and MHCO had several wonderful accomplishments. We are extremely proud of the children's academic and personal achievements.

Five students graduated High School for a graduation rate of 100%. Two of these graduates were the very first in their families to achieve this honor and recognition. Additionally, six students received certifications from VGCC. Our one UNC-C graduate received Cum Laude degrees in Accounting and Finance. The promotion rate for the remaining students was again 100% and the campus GPA at the end of the year was 84.6. Of the youth aged 16 and over, 89.7% were employed in the community. The children and ILP residents also participated in a variety of extra curriculars including Sports, Band, Girl Scouts, and ROTC. One student-athlete earned All-Conference in Football. We also applaud the efforts and support of the Houseparents, Tutors, and the entire staff to help encourage the children to be confident and achieve tremendous successes that help prepare them for a successful future. Well done everyone!

Several program enhancements and achievements were also accomplished in 2021. MHCO implemented the Cornell University CARE Trauma Informed Model. This several year process helps all employees recognize the impact traumas can have on children and guide staff to help address issues in a preventative, supportive, and reflective manner. This wonderful enhancement was made possible by a second grant from the Triangle North Healthcare Foundation.

Transitional Living Cottages were opened as an intermediary step before the Independent Living Program. Houseparents help each young adult understand their level of proficiency on several independent living skills and helps them work on any deficiencies to better prepare them for that important step toward independence. Additionally, MHCO was relicensed and received personal recognition that it was a "Really, really good review" from our Licensing Representative. MHCO was also reaccredited for three years through the Council on Accreditation.

MHCO was also Blessed to receive capital improvements from several friends of the Home. Walden University Mobilize for Good remodeled the gym lobby to be a place for the kids to hang out. This incredible gift was filmed and helps bring recognition of MHCO to others. Four MHCO employees have graduated or are enrolled in Walden's MSW program. Cameron Honour of Old Timers Roofing and Dave Alligood provided materials and labor to completely replace the Walker Building's roof.

The shingles were provided by Certainteed. Michael and Hilary Verville with Verville Interiors renovated God's Half Acre by raising all the headstones to a uniform level and cleaning each headstone. These gracious acts provided much needed improvements that would likely not have occurred without their generous gifts.

These amazing successes continue to support the ongoing wonderful work being done for the children and their families as they seek to overcome their own challenges and become successful. MHCO is only able to accomplish all these achievements due to of the support, care, and love you share. Your recurring donations, planned gifts, grants, and gifts of talent, time, and treasure ensure the children's lives are guided by your light toward a brighter future. MHCO provides loving care for children and young adults.

MHCO added an additional component to the programs this year by opening 2 Transitional Living Cottages. These cottages are part of the Independent Living Program and serves youth who are 17-19 as they learn skills needed for more independent living. The cottages are staffed 24/7 by Child Care Worker couples who provide supports and serve as a bridge between the Direct Care program before moving into the apartments in ILP. In 2021, all the ILP admissions were in the TLC cottages.






